Butte County was one of the original 27 counties created in 1850. It was named for the Sutter Buttes which were originally in the county. The word Butte, in French, means a hill detached from any mountain range.

The eastern half of the county lies in the Sierra foothills and the western half in the flat Sacramento Valley. The western boundary is the Sacramento River. The dominant feature is Oroville Dam and the lake behind it that controls the flow of the Feather River which runs through the middle of the county. Along the Sacramento River are the Sacramento River Wildlife Area and the Upper Butte Basin Wildlife Area.

Manufacturing, primarily food processing and wood products, leads the economy. The county produces 4.4% of the timber in the state. Rice farming along the Sacramento River is a large-scale enterprise. Almonds, English walnuts, and dried plums are other leading farm crops.

Highways 70 and 99 cut through the middle of the county connecting with Marysville to the south and Chico to the north. Highway 70 cuts on a diagonal through the scenic Feather River Canyon to connect eventually with Highway 395 on the eastern side of the Sierras.

Cities: Chico, Oroville, Paradise, Gridley, Biggs. Towns: Richvale, Durham. Sights: Oroville Dam.


Introduction

California is comprised of 58 counties. The state, the third largest in the U.S., has the greatest diversity of geography of any of the states. 
Chico's City Hall. The city was founded by John Bidwell in 1860. Today the population is 86,000. (June 2006)

The brewery is environmentally savy. The parking lot is covered by solar voltaic cells. (October 2011)






