

The Paradise City Hall. Paradise is mostly a retirement community in the foothills. (February 2012)




Feather River Canyon

Oregon City was founded by gold miners from Oregon in 1848. (April 2003)



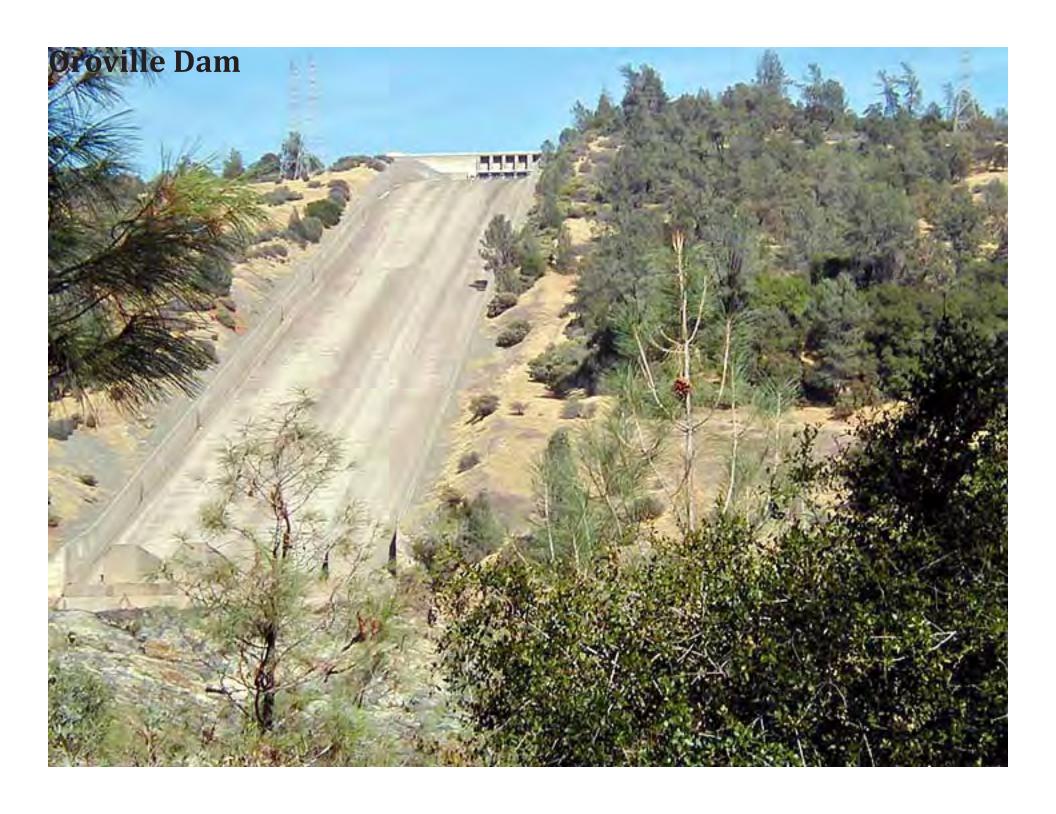

The temple was built in 1863. The city of Oroville acquired ownership in 1937. It was opened as a museum in 1949. (April 2003)



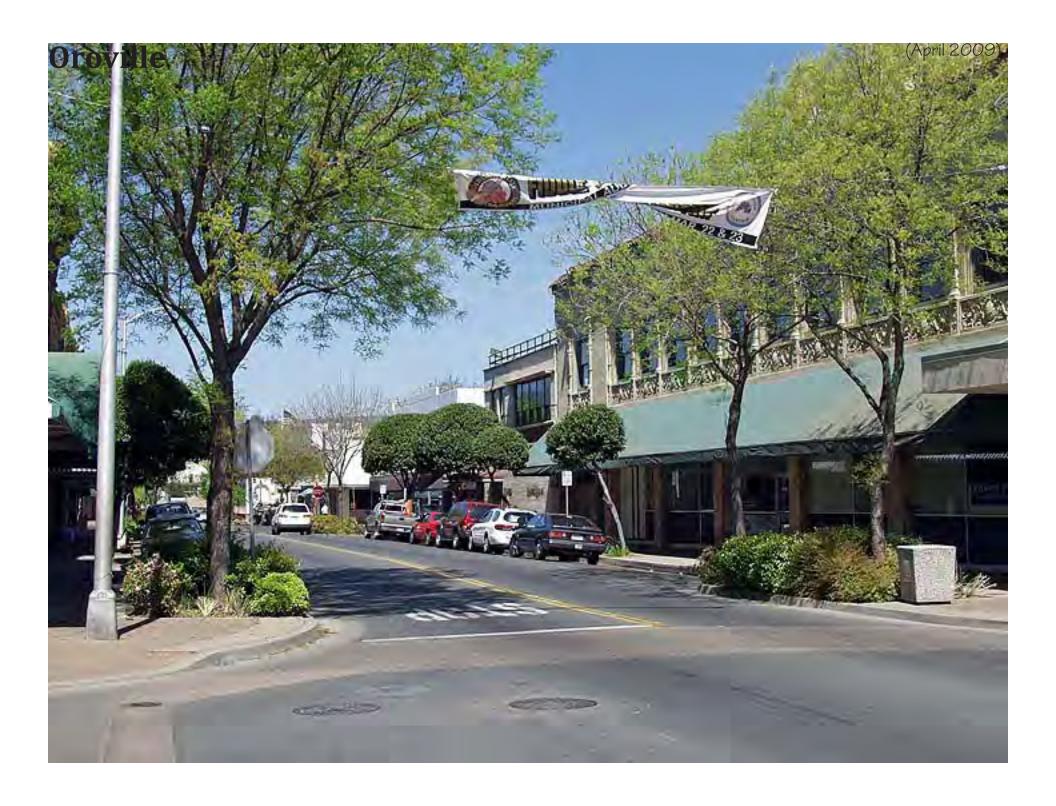

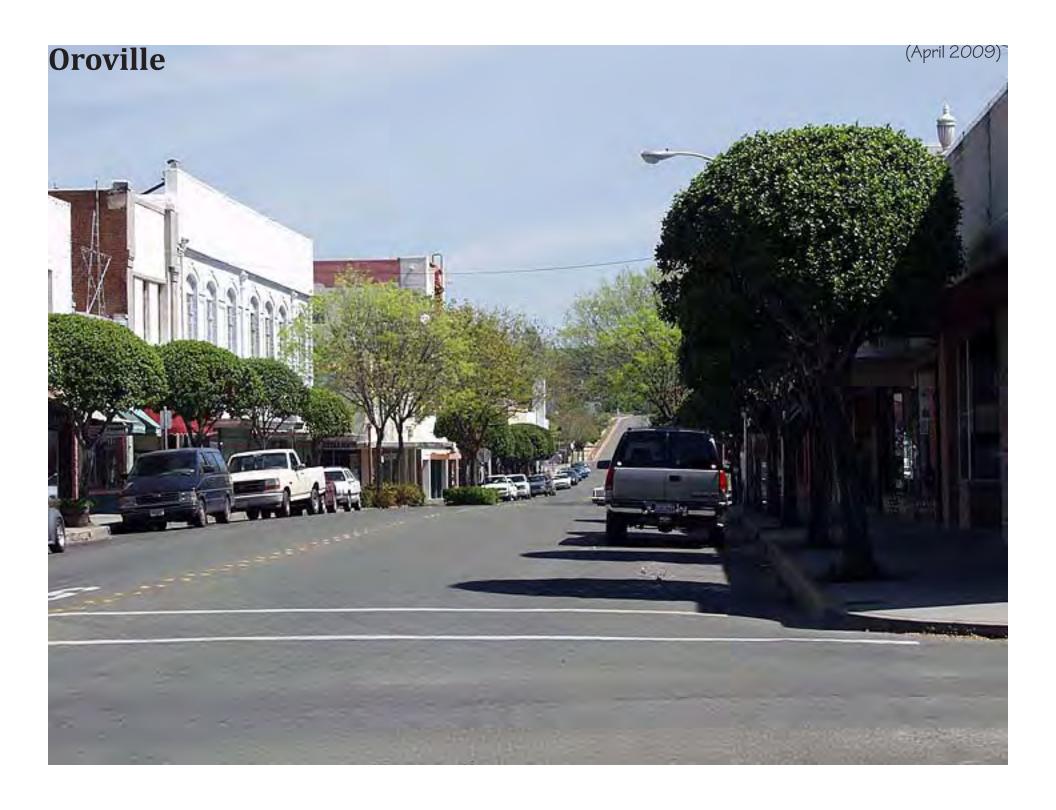
The museum is actually three temples – Taoist, Confucian and Buddhist. It also includes an herb shop and display rooms for art and fashion. (April 2003)

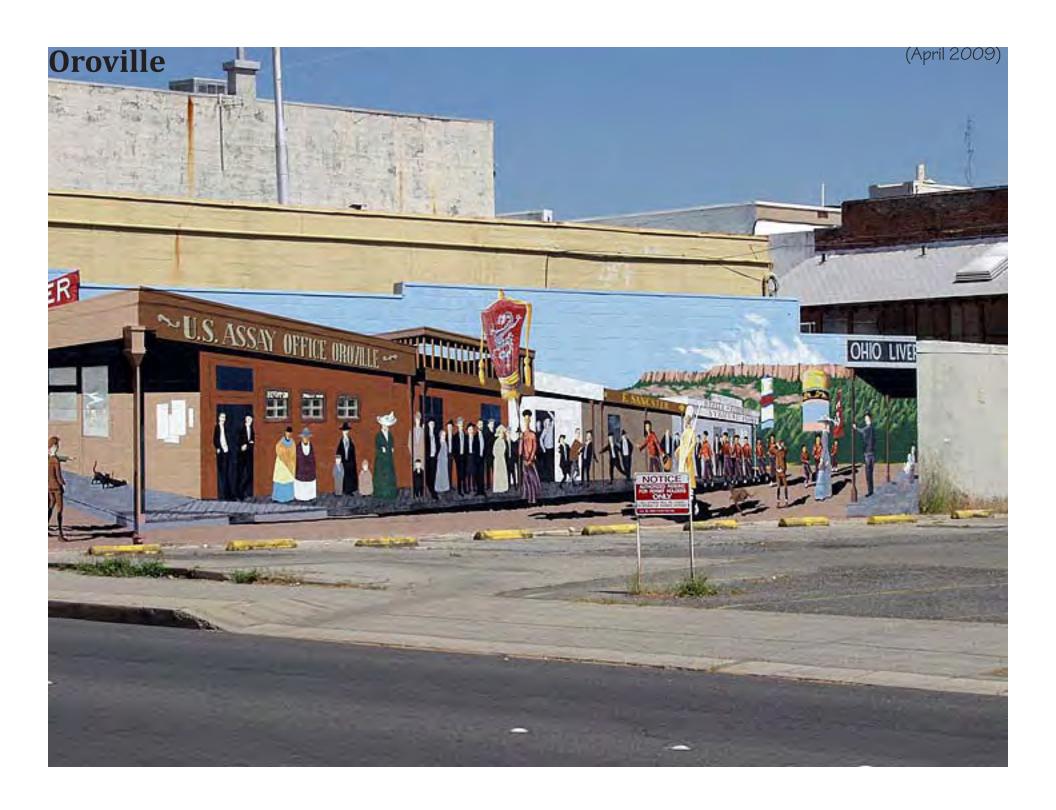


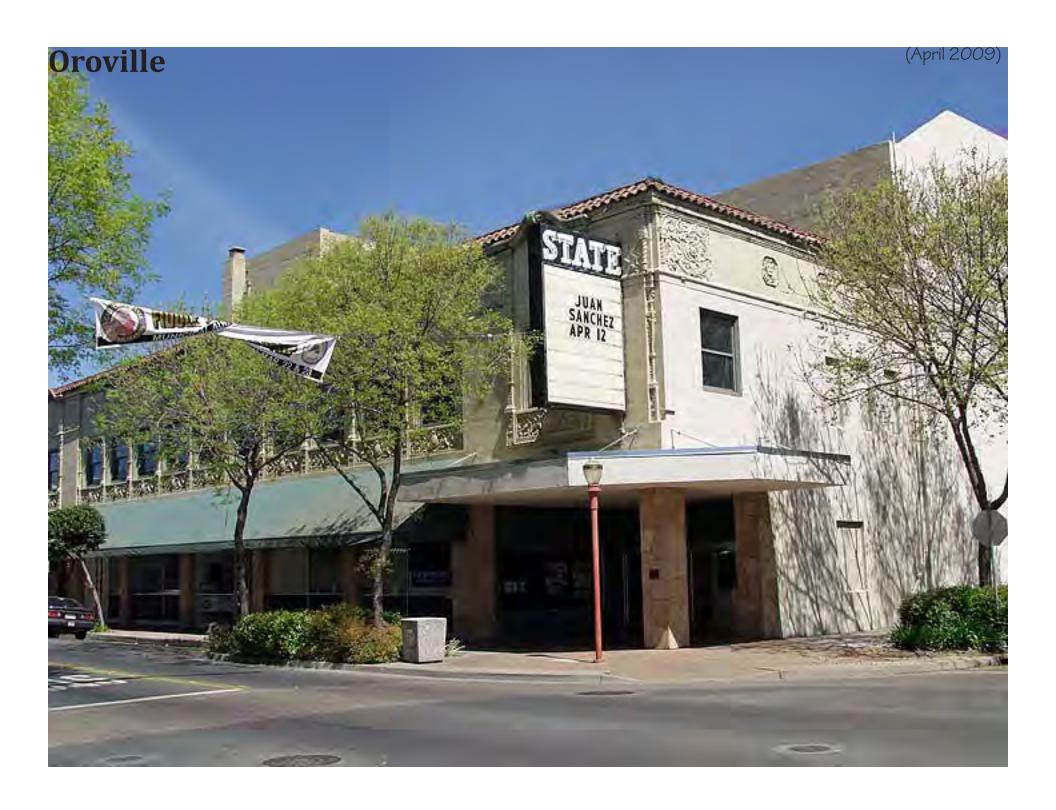


Oroville

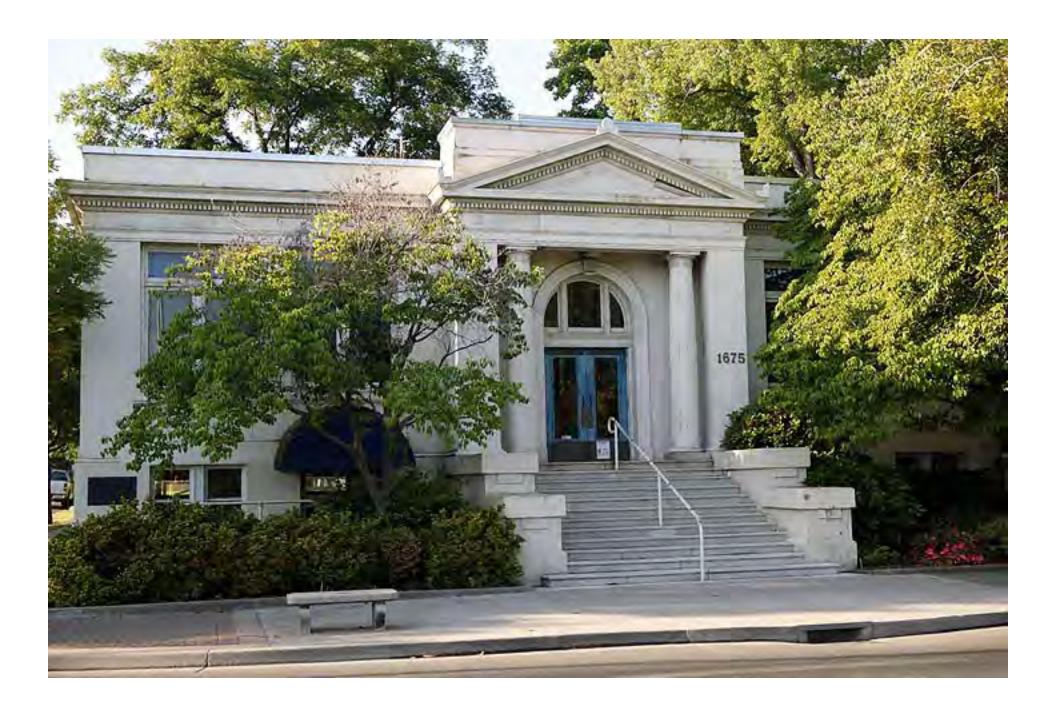

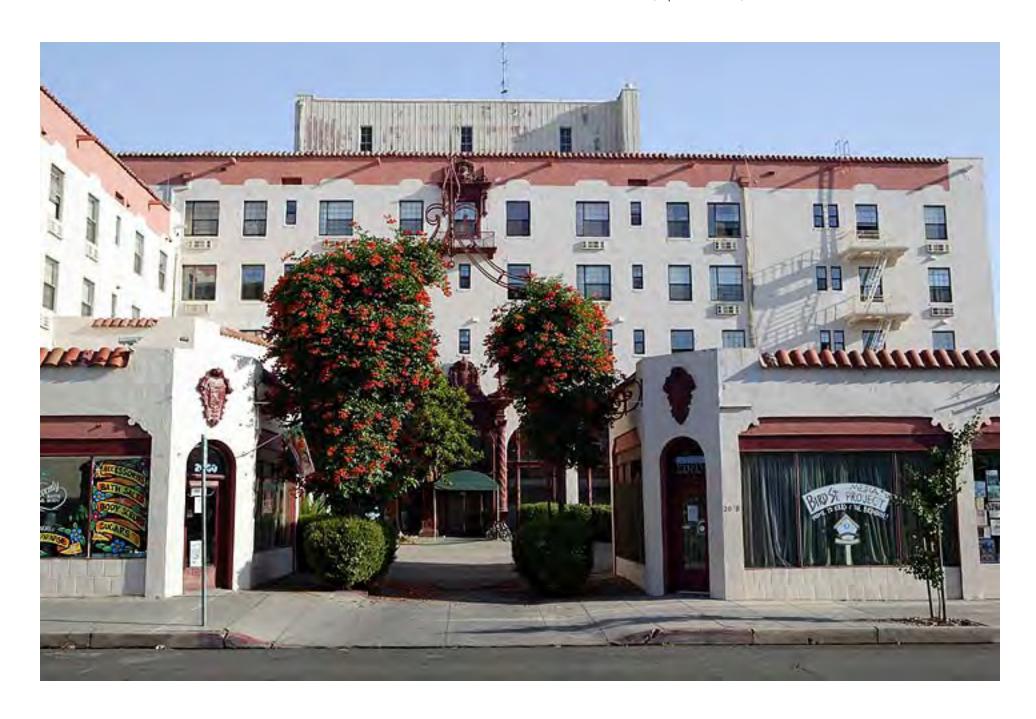

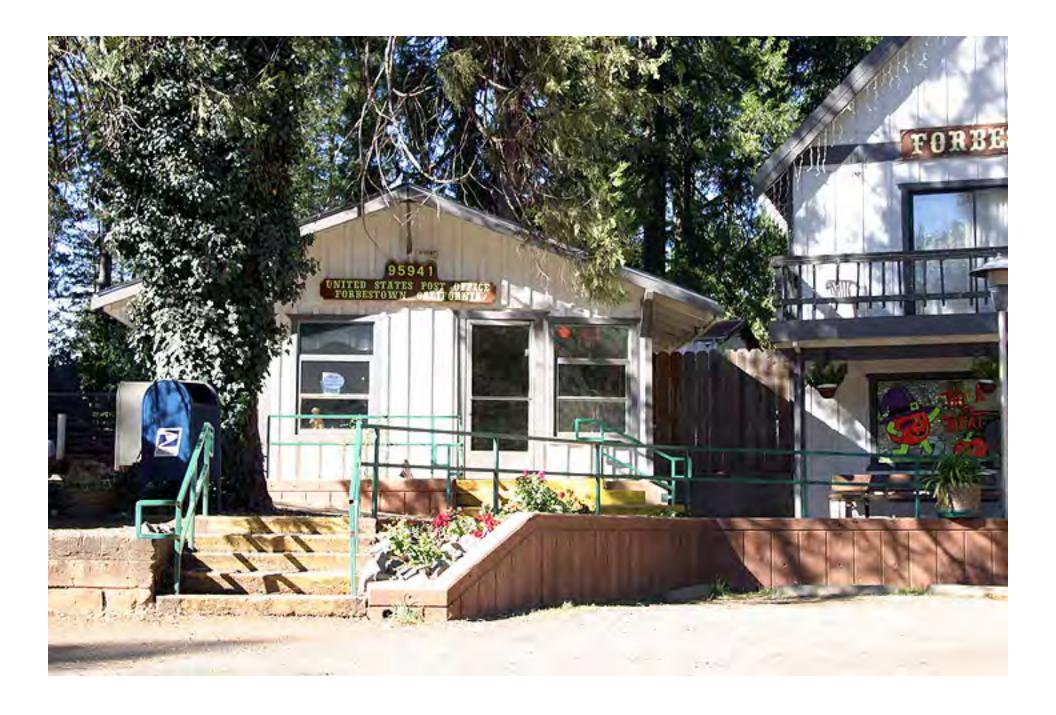


Forbestown
