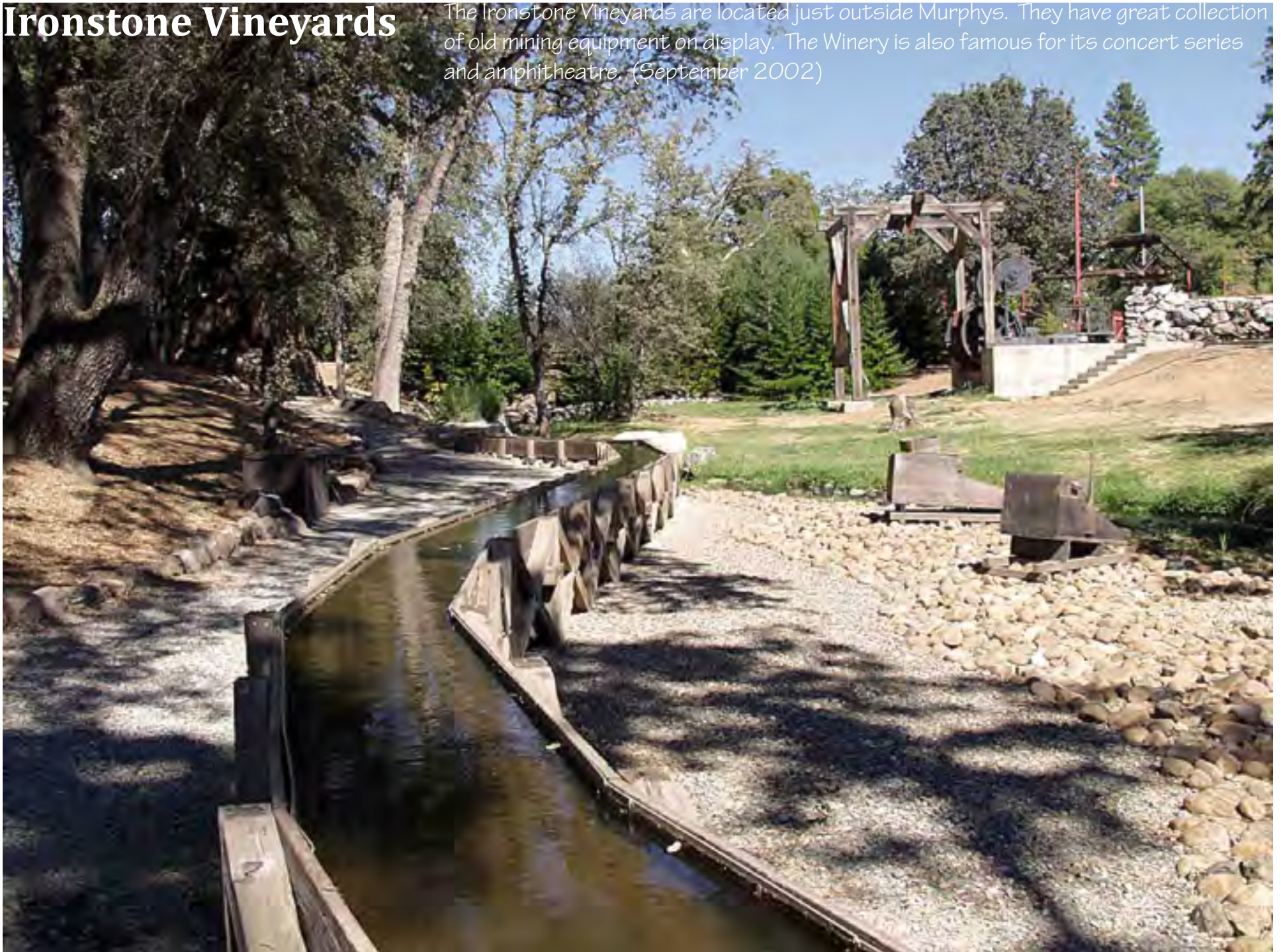

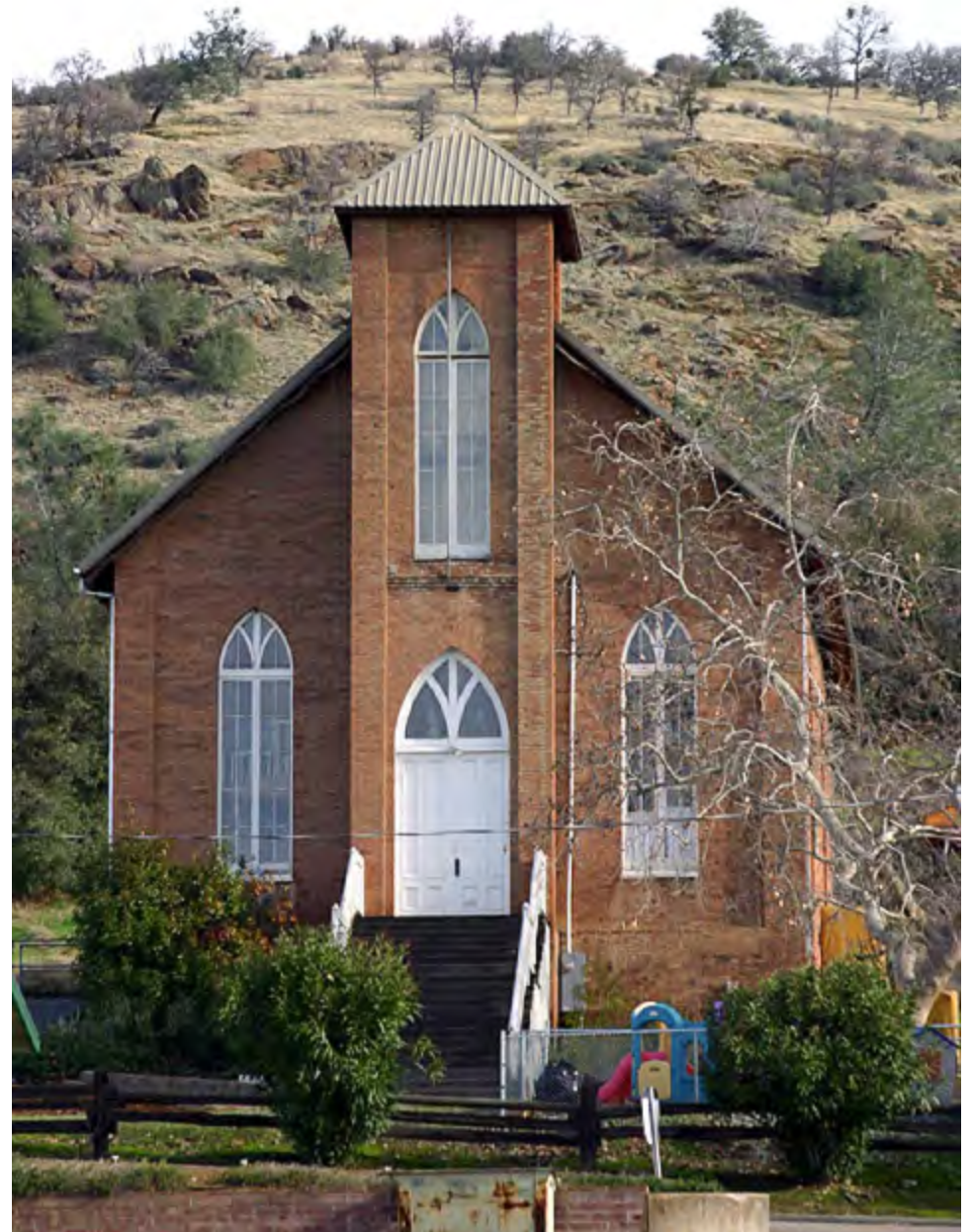
# Copperopolis
