El Dorado was created in 1850 as one of the original counties. The name meaning "the gilded one" in Spanish was given the county because of the discovery of gold at Coloma. The county stretches to Lake Tahoe and includes the southern part of the lake. The western part of the county includes a large part of Folsom Lake and includes the new towns of El Dorado Hills and Cameron Park which are suburbs of Sacramento.

Highway 50 runs east/west through the county and Highway 49 cuts through the old gold mining areas. Nearly all the towns are located on these two highways.

Timber production is still important here. The county produces 5.5% of the state's timber.

Cities: Placerville, South Lake Tahoe. Towns: Coloma.



This gold mining town was founded in 1849. It got a post office in 1851. The town is unusual in that the main street is 100 feet wide. The population is 2,367. (February 2007)






















The town is nicknamed Growlersburg because of the sound the gold ore made in the miner's pockets when they walked. (February 2007)




