Fresno County was created in 1856 out of Mariposa County. Fresno in Spanish means "ash tree." There are numerous ash trees in the county.

Fresno County stretches from the Coast Ranges to the crest of the Sierras. Most of the county lies on the flat valley floor. The Sierra portion is made up of the Sierra National Forest and Kings Canyon National Park. It also includes part of the Giant Sequoia National Monument.

Fresno is in an arid area and it did not develop until irrigation brought water to the land. Moses Church developed the first canals, called "Church Ditches." The first major crop was wheat. Francis Eisen began the wine industry. He also began the raisin industry in 1875 when he accidentally let his grapes dry on the vine. A.Y. Easterby and Clovis Cole developed extensive grain and cattle ranches.

Today Fresno is the number one farm county in the nation. It produces nearly \$3.5 billion in farm products yearly. Grapes, poultry, cotton, tomatoes, milk, cattle and calves, almonds, lettuce, plums and peaches lead the list of farm products.

Real prosperity didn't come to the county until large amounts of irrigation water arrived through the Central Valley Project. The San Joaquin River forms the northern border of the county. Friant Dam is located on the river forming Millerton Lake. The water from the river is sent north through the Madera Canal and south through the Friant-Kern Canal.

The Kings River flows through the middle of the county. It is at this point the valley tips to the south. Instead of flowing to the San Joaquin, the river flows south and splits into many channels. Most of the water is removed from the river for irrigation. Pine Flat Dam on the river stores water in the Sierras.

On the west side of Fresno County is land that had been the scene of real estate developments to promote farming early in the century. Ground wells worked for a while but with drought there was an attempt to pump water from Fresno Slough that runs along the west side of the county. A lawsuit was filed by Henry Miller who owned most of the land on the west side of the valley. The matter really wasn't settled until


the arrival of Central Valley Project Water in the 1940's. The Westlands Water District was formed to distribute the water in 1952. This nearly 700-square-mile district stretches along the east side of I-5 from Mendota to Kettleman City.

For fifty years this area has grown cotton and other crops. The farmers have not only received cheap water, for as little as \$2 an acrefoot, but also received crop subsidies to make up for the low price of cotton. This double subsidy has sparked considerable political controversy. With low crop prices and changes in the CVP that require more water to be devoted to wildlife, it all may come to an end. The Water District has proposed to take a third of the land out of production if the federal government will buy the land.

A glance at the map will tell you a significant difference between the farming practiced on the west side of the county and the farming practiced on the east side of Highway 41 that runs though the middle of the county. There are fewer roads and fewer towns on the west side. The towns lack a middle class and suffer from neglect. Most people are either poor farm workers or one of the 600 farmers that make up the Westland Water District. On the east side, the farms are smaller and have orchard crops. The towns are neat, tree-covered and have a middle class. There is a sense of community that is lacking on the west side.

Highway 180 runs east/west through Fresno and into the Giant Sequoia National Monument. It also borders the Mendota Wildlife Area. I-5 runs along the west side of the valley. At Highway 145 you can smell and see the Harris Ranch Feed Lot, the largest in California, with the capacity to produce 250,000 cattle a year.






Fresno City Hall






Fresno Community College


Fresno Junior College was the first in the nation. Fresno also has another first – the credit card. It was introduced by the Bank of America in 1958. (June 2009)

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


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



