Lake County Data Population: 58,309 (Rank: 40) Land Area (square miles): 1,258 (Rank: 38)

The county was created in 1861 from Napa County. It is named for Clear Lake that is the geographic center of the county. The lake is formed by two grabens. "Graben" is German for grave and in geography it refers to a low place usually formed by an up and down slip in a fault. One side rises up and the other side slips down creating a low spot where a lake can form. In this case the water is blocked by a lava flow at the south end forming the lake. Mt. Konocti, an extinct volcano, rests next to the lake.

The lake is not very deep, 30 feet at the most. Clear Lake is famous internationally as one of the first places where DDT worked its way up the food chain and reached sufficient concentration to kill aquatic birds. The concept of biological magnification was developed from the data collected here.

Another characteristic of the lake is its green algae. This is due to the shallowness of the lake. The algae provide food for the black bass that make the lake attractive to fishermen.

Access to the county is through minor highways. Highway 29 works its way from the Napa Valley into the lake and Highway 20 connects the lake with the Sacramento Valley and Highway 101. All can be considered scenic.

The hills surrounding the lake contain small farms growing mostly grapes and pears.

Introduction

California is comprised of 58 counties. The state, the third largest in the U.S., has the greatest diversity of geography of any of the states. 
Lake County









The population of Lakeport is about 4,500. The town was founded in 1861. (April 2002)





















Cobb Mountain








Clearlake got a post office in 1923. The city was incorporated in 1980. It has a population of about 15,000. (August 2003)














Lucerne

Nice and Lucerne are old resort cities on the east side of the lake dating back to the 1920's. (August 2003)


