Population: 210,554 (Rank: 26)

Land Area (square miles): 1,929 (Rank: 25)

The county is named after the Merced River. Lt. Gabriel Moraga gave the river the name. His troops were very thirsty when they found the river and he named it after Our Lady of Mercy, “de las Mercedes” in Spanish. Merced is the seat of Merced County.

The county stretches across the valley from the foothills. In the eastern part of the county along the Merced River are the long mounds of gravel ripped up by gold dredges. Snelling, the original county seat, is located here. There is a dam and power plant at Merced Falls.

On the other side of the county is San Luis Reservoir, which is a key part of the California Aqueduct, transferring water from north to south. Overlooking the reservoir is a visitor center with an informative program about how the California Water Project works.

The western part of the county along the San Joaquin River is swampy land made up of wildlife refuges: Kesterson and San Luis National Wildlife Refuges and the Volta and Los Banos Wildlife areas. It was at the Kesterson Refuge that deformed wildlife was discovered. Selenium, which is a natural part of the soil, became concentrated here because of the run-off of farm irrigation water and caused the birth defects.

The county has two major highways (99 and 5) running north and south. Most of the towns are located along 99 and a few small towns are located on Highway 33. High-

way 140 cuts through the middle of the county and winds its way to Yosemite. Today Merced ranks 5th in the state in farm production with milk and chickens leading the way. There is a large Foster Farms processing plant in Livingston.
