



The only thing in Cuyama is the high school. The population is only 57. Most of the people live in New Cuyama a few miles down the road. (July 2005)

In the Spring the valley turns yellow. Highway $166\,\mathrm{runs}$ through the valley. (March 2010)














Casmalia
