Santa Cruz lies entirely in the coastal ranges. The county surrounds the northern curve of Monterey Bay. It is mostly mountainous except for the flat plain of the Pajaro River where strawberries are grown.

Most of the people live along the coast with Santa Cruz being the largest city. The area is famous as a resort with summer homes for the well-to-do to escape the heat of the Central Valley.

It includes the most southern range of Redwoods. The Big Basin Redwood Park was created to protect the redwoods from logging. There are also state beach parks along the coast: Natural Bridges, Cowell, Twin Lakes, Capitola, Seacliff, La Selva, Manresa and Sunset.

Scenic Highway 1 runs along the coast and Highway 17 is the main route from San Jose. Highway 9, which connects Highway 35 and Highway 1, is the scenic route. This is also the route to Big Basin.

The county was one of the original counties. Its name was Branciforte after the original Spanish pueblo founded in 1797. Two months later the name was changed to Santa Cruz after the name of the mission.

In the southern part of the county is the Pajaro Valley formed by a river of the same name. This is a farm area specializing in strawberry production.

Cities: Capitola, Santa Cruz, Scotts Valley, Watsonville. Towns: Felton, Boulder Creek, Davenport, Pajaro Dunes, BenLomond, Brookdale.


Introduction

California is comprised of 58 counties. The state, the third largest in the U.S., has the greatest diversity of geography of any of the states. 
Now we are organizing our collection by county using all of our photos dating back to 2001.

























Santa Cruz

This is not the Santa Cruz Mission. There is a small replica of that to the right of the church. (April 2002)










The community was started by the Spanish in 1791. It became a city in 1866. Today it has a population of 60,000. (October 2004)











Santa Cruz (October 2004)










































This statue memorializes the innocent who have been killed in wars. (September 2009)
