Sonoma is divided into two parts. Sonoma Valley is drained by the Petaluma River into San Pablo Bay and the Russian River area drains into the Pacific Ocean.

Jack London, the famous writer, called the Sonoma Valley the Valley of the Moon. His home has been turned into the Jack London State Park. There is also the Annadel State Park and the San Pablo Bay National Wildlife Refuge. The valley is famous for its wine production and wineries. The Russian River area includes redwood forests.

Highway 1 runs along the coast where the Kruse Rhododendron State Reserve, Salt Point State Park, Fort Ross, Sonoma Coast State Beach are located. At Jenner, a small coastal community, the Russian River enters the ocean.

Sonoma is one of the original 1850 counties. There are two versions about where the name comes from. One is that the name is a Chocuyen Indian name translated as "Valley of the Moon." The other is that the name Sonoma comes from Yukian Wappo Indian language, "tso" (earth) and "noma" (village).

Introduction

California is comprised of 58 counties. The state, the third largest in the U.S., has the greatest diversity of geography of any of the states. Jenner began when John Rule bought 4,000 acres from a Spanish land grant in 1867. Rule encouraged a writer, Charles Jenner, to settle there. Today the community has a population of 137. (May 2008)



Plantation was a community that was created in the 1860's. Today it has become a camp for kids beginning in 1952. (May 2008)





Fort Ross was established by the Russians from 1812 to 1842. Eventually it was sold to John Sutter. (May 2002)



























Cazadero has a population of 354. It has many summer camps. It began as a community in the 1870's. (May 2008)




