Tuolumne County Data Population: 54,501 (Rank: 42) Land Area (square miles): 2,235 (Rank: 23)

Tuolumne County is perhaps the most scenic of the gold rush counties. It stretches to the crest of the Sierras and includes the northern part of Yosemite Park. Two rivers, the Tuolumne and the Stanislaus, flow through the county from the Sierras to the valley.

The Tuolumne River high in the Sierras forms a grand canyon similar to Yosemite. The canyon is partially filled by Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, which is San Francisco's source of water. John Muir fought the construction of the dam and lost. Muir thought that the valley was just as beautiful as Yosemite. Lower on the river is Don Pedro reservoir, which is operated by the Turlock and Modesto Irrigation Districts.

On the Stanislaus River is the New Melones Reservoir operated by the Bureau of Reclamation. Below New Melones is Lake Tulloch.

While all the highways across the Sierra are scenic, Highways 108 and 120 are among the most incredible. Highway 108 crests the Sierra at Sonora Pass, the second highest of the Sierra passes, and then twists down the eastern side following the Walker River. Highway 120 crosses through Yosemite Park. There is a fee to drive the road that crosses through Tuolumne Meadows that is a jumping off point for back country trails through Yosemite. Along the way one encounters Olmstead Point Vista, which provides a view of Yosemite Valley from the east. The park's east

Now we are organizing our collection by county using all of our photos dating back to 2001.

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




This was a gold rush town that began in 1850. In 1945 the state turned the town into a park. (January 2004)










































This old gold mining town dates from 1849. It acquired a post office in 1854. It was famed for its large Chinese population. Today only 126 people live here. (January 2004)
